## Autumn Term 2018



A warm welcome to Autumn Term 2018 from everyone on the Education Team at the Diocese of Chichester. This month has seen the publication of the Commission into RE report, which will no doubt generate a lot of discussion and debate. ## RE News

### RE in the new SIAMS Schedule

The new SIAMS schedule comes into effect this September. If you haven't yet seen the new schedule it can be downloaded from the Church of England Education Office website along with a new toolkit. The new schedule places greater emphasis on your school's vision, which should be in line with the Church of England's Vision for Education (Wisdom, Hope, Community and Dignity) and form the basis for everything you do. Inspectors will ask the question 'How effective is the school's distinctive Christian vision established and promoted by leadership at all levels, in enabling pupils and adults to flourish?' and will explore this through seven strands.

The RE section (Strand 7) judges the effectiveness of religious education. Inspectors will explore both the quality of the RE curriculum (to what extent it develops pupils' religious literacy) and the leadership and management of RE (sharing good practice, the extent to which teachers engage in professional development and the school's system of assessment). Schools will need to be able to demonstrate they are delivering a broad and balanced religious education curriculum which allows pupils to explore the core theological concepts of Christianity and the other world religions. There is an expectation that RE will engage with religions as living world faiths, reflecting the lives of people locally and globally, as well as providing a safe space for reflection and spiritual engagement.

The implications of the new schedule for RE subject leaders will be one of the areas for discussion at our Autumn Term Primary RE Network Meetings.

## Commission on RE

September 2017 saw the publication of an interim report from the Commission on RE on the future of Religious Education. The final report is now published (September 2018) and makes 11 recommendations on the place of religious education in schools. The Church of England's Chief Education Officer, Nigel Genders, said:

*'This report calls for a new vision for Religious Education (RE) which is vital if we are to equip children for life in the modern world where religion and belief play such important roles ..... We fully support the policy of developing a Statement of Entitlement to RE and are pleased to see the Commission endorsing an approach which we already use in Church of England schools..... We look forward to playing our part in working with the education community to achieve this and building an irresistible consensus of agreement about the subject'.*

The recommendations in the report cover many areas from what the subject should be called, curriculum recommendations, training recommendations and recommendations about the right of withdrawal. The report and its implications will be discussed at our RE network meetings this term.

## Why RE Matters

RE is a statutory subject for all pupils in schools, from 5-18 years of age, serving the purpose of enabling children to become more religiously literate. Media stories that feature issues relating to faith and beliefs continue to hit our headlines from President Trump calling for a national day of prayer, to the news that Justin Bieber is re-dedicating 'his life to Christ'.

The ability to understand the faith or belief of individuals and communities, and how these may shape their culture and behaviour, is an invaluable asset for children in modern day Britain. Explaining religious and non-religious worldviews in an academic way allows young people to engage with the complexities of belief, to avoid stereotyping and to contribute to an informed debate. RE in our church schools should therefore be of a high quality and an essential part of a school's distinctive Christian vision.

## Diocese of Chichester RE Network Meetings

We are continuing to run our popular RE network meetings and encourage **all** RE leaders to attend. If you haven't come along before please do get in touch and let us know you are interested in attending. Network meetings are a great way to keep up to date with what is happening the world of RE, find out about the training and support that is available, explore resources, share ideas and expertise and make new friends!

## Understanding Christianity - Update

This year will be the last year we are offering Understanding Christianity training to our schools. Over two thirds of our schools have now completed the training and there is already evidence that it is having an impact. It is the expectation of the Diocese that all our schools should use Understanding Christianity as the basis for meeting the requirements of the Church of England RE Statement of Entitlement for the teaching of Christianity. Subject leaders have found the training invaluable in developing their subject knowledge, confidence and expertise and have really enjoyed getting to know the materials and networking with colleagues. ## Sharing RE Practice

### St Nicolas & St Mary Passion Play



Last term, St Nicolas and St Mary CE Primary School in Shoreham staged a brilliant Passion Play depicting the life of Christ. Children, staff, parents and governors dressed in role and enacted the gospel narrative across a whole day at school. To start the day, everyone experienced a Roman Census, followed by the birth of Christ with a real donkey in a stable created in the school grounds. Next, they visited Joseph's carpentry shop and the Temple indoors, before gathering by the school pond for Jesus' baptism and temptation. Still out-

side, the children saw the calling of the disciples, listened to the Sermon on the Mount (see picture below) and shared bread and fish. After lunch, parables and miracles were celebrated before the Passover Meal was recreated in the school hall. Finally, everyone went outside to the Garden of Gethsemane, followed by the trial, the cross, the resurrection and the ascension of Christ.

The day was led by headteacher, David Etherton, who had the role of Luke the historian and story-teller. The school acts out the Passion every five years so that every child experiences it during their time in primary school. It was a wonderful example of experiential and first-hand learning.
