Something To Reflect On:	Yesterday, (2 nd . February 2021,) Sir Captain Tom Moore sadly died from Coronavirus. Sir Captain Tom was 100 years old and a retired military person. He became well known last year when he wanted to help NHS Charities Together which support the NHS staff and volunteers caring for COVID-19 patients. He decided to do a sponsored walk, planning to walk 100 lengths of his garden before his 100th. birthday and hoped that he would be able to raise £1,000. This would be a challenge for him as he needs to walk with a mobility aid, but he was determined to give it a go. News of his sponsored walk went viral, spreading around the world and over 1 and a half million people sponsored him, encouraging him to keep on walking and enabling him to raise more than a staggering £32 million, which will actually total £39 million with Gift Aid added in. Michael Ball, a famous singer, heard about Captain Tom's walk and they recorded a song together called 'You'll Never Walk Alone' which is also raising money for the NHS, (included here as part of this Collective Worship.) Sir Captain Tom was the first 100 year old ever to have a song at Number 1 in the Music Charts, it was Number 1 on his 100th. birthday! Giving of himself diligently to help others was a very extraordinary thing that Sir Captain Tom did, but what also made Sir Captain Tom so special was what he represented. He was one example of so many special and selfless people, during this time of Coronavirus, who have been undertaking good deeds and showing acts of kindness to help others affected by the pandemic. He inspired others to fundraise as well. In this time of the Coronavirus pandemic when life seems so difficult, shocking and full of bad news, Sir Captain Tom's efforts brought optimism to people, helping lift their spirits, showing that in the worst of times, humanity can be the best. He was unassuming and humble and always had wise words of wisdom and hope which he shared with others. Recognising his special contribution to symbolising this historic and unpreced
