Music for All : Grants for Community Music Projects

these grants can be used for musical instruments and individuals who do not have access to instruments and lessons. Applications are assessed three times a year in Spring, Summer and Autumn and the next deadline for applications is the 1st July 2020 for September 2020.

Funding for Music Making Projects For Young People in Challenging Circumstances (England)

Schools as well as other not-for-profit organisations can apply for grants to fund developmental music-making projects for children and young people in challenging circumstances as well as for projects that support the development of the workforce, organisations and the wider music making sector. The funding is being made available through Youth Music, England's largest children's music charity, which provides funding for music-making projects. Youth Making's funding programme is made up of three separate funds. <u>More information</u>

Kellogg's Breakfast Club Grants Programme

Kelloggs is offering your school the opportunity to apply for a grant of £1000 to help fund your breakfast club. A limited number of grants are available so priority will be given to those schools that have 40% and above of children in receipt of pupil premium funding. Funding for Music Making Activities (UK)

<u>The Michael Tippett Musical Foundation</u> is a small Foundation with funds from the royalties generated by performances, broadcasts and publication of the works of composer Michael Tippett (1905-98). When he set up the Foundation, Tippett said he wanted the funds to go towards young musicians and composers, not towards promoting his own works. As funds are limited the Trustees have decided to focus on one area of musical activity as their single priority, described <u>here</u>

<u>The Burns Price Foundation (BPF)</u> - Making Peace Building Community - Promoting good citizenship amongst young people in the UK.

BPF offers grants to young people between the ages of 11-18 to fund adult-supervised projects that are for the public benefit and have a community-enhancing purpose. They are particularly keen to support projects that focus on reparation, reconciliation, peace building, restorative justice or care for the local environment. For more information go <u>here</u>

British Council International Exchanges for Schools

Schools in England can apply for grants to take pupils aged 11 and above overseas. The funding which is being made available through the British Council's International Exchanges Programme is aimed at schools with a high proportion of pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds and with above-average numbers of pupil premium students. Young people are encouraged to stay with host families where possible, giving them the best opportunity to practise their language skills and be fully immersed in another culture. <u>Nineveh Charitable Trust</u>- UK based not for profit organisations and schools can apply for funding to the Nineveh Charitable Trust for a broad range of projects and activities that promote a better understanding of the environment and countryside, whilst facilitating improved access, education and research. Whilst the Trust does not specify a minimum or maximum grant amount that can be applied for, an analysis of previous grants would suggest a maximum of £5,000 per year for up to three years.

<u>The Jerusalem Trust RE Resources Grant</u>- grants of up to £600 are available for **secondary schools** to support the purchase of resources for teaching Religious Education.

<u>Woodland Trust Free Trees</u>- The Woodland Trust has free tree packs to give away to schools as well as useful resources.
